## RAM Power Vocabulary Program

The SRMS and SRHS vocabulary programs are based on PSAT and SAT vocabulary lists. The words on the PSAT and SAT are the words that a well educated student should know; they are the words used by writers, scholars and scientists. Following are suggestions to assist you in making these words part of your writing and discussions:

- 1- The best long-term vocabulary plan is still to READ for 20-30 minutes daily. As you read, start a journal of words that you cannot discern from reading the text.
- 2- Make and use flashcards to learn and review vocabulary words; write down the word, the definition and a sentence in which the word is used.
- 3- Use pictures to help you remember a definition- draw them or find them.
- 4- Create funny sentences using mnemonics to help memorize definitions.
- 5- Use the word in a sentence.
- 6- Pick 5-10 of these words to review daily using a note card with definitions on the back.
- 7- Plan to substitute these words for the words you normally use. Ex. Use variegated instead of striped, verdant instead of green. You might annoy your friends, but you will learn the words.
- 8- Create a mnemonic with the word. Ex. The Grand Floridian is a grandiose hotel in Disney World. Erratic behavior produces many errors.

Also included are the **Get Your Wordsworth** prefixes/suffixes presented in 7-8<sup>th</sup> grade. Keep reviewing them. Extra words follow the end of the list for those of you serious about empowering your academic vocabulary.
