Since 2000, the H&SA has collected and distributed well over \$190,000 to augment the educational program of the Southern Regional School District. This has been accomplished through fundraising events and membership dues. The H&SA has been able to supply picture restoration for the 9/10 library, video editing equipment for SNN and defibrillators across the district.
