Student Summit Provides Surfside Classroom

Spending a day at the beach in October with the school's approval sounds too good to be true. Louise Kmosko's Maxtap class did just that when they moved their classroom surfside to Island Beach State Park, a ten-mile classroom, to attend Clean Ocean Action's Student Summit. Through the hands-on marine and environmental education activities students became scientists for a day.

Middle school students from 12 other area schools joined Southern students for the event. The day was divided into two halves. One half included a "field trip" where local naturalists and other marine education professionals led teachers and students in one of the field activities: birding, seining, beach trash census, water

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testing, marine mammal rescue, and exploring Island Beach. The other half of the day was spent on "stations." Here students used the skills of professionals to read weather conditions, measure live horseshoe crabs, identify mollusks, and examine and handle marine invertebrates. They also saw demonstrations on solar energy and non-point source pollution. Students from the Ocean County Technical and Vocational School's Marine Academy of Technology and Environmental Studies in Toms River served as peer teachers at the activity workstations.

The hands down favorite activity of all the students was handling and learning about horseshoe crabs, followed by the touch tanks of live invertebrates and the demonstration of non-source point pollution. The day's activities were interdisciplinary involving science, math, and social studies and complemented the New Jersey Core Curriculum Standards in those areas.

Kmosko stated, "I was looking to the summit to give students background in some of the important issues in marine science for our Oceanography unit in the spring. It did that in a very hands-on, in-the-field sort of way. In reading their notes and reactions the next day, I could see that many new areas of interest have been sparked and that some of these new interests will surely be the topics of their individual in-depth studies in the spring. One student even took some time to snap photos of possible subject matter for an ocean mural to be painted in our classroom."

To enhance the day's educational experience, the COA provided teachers with materials prior to the event along with lessons and resources for a follow-up, giving both teachers and students the opportunity to "get informed,"

Defibrillator Training Begins for Southern Staff

The defibrillators have arrived and training has begun. A representative from the company certified and demonstrated the machines and talked to the school nurses and athletic trainers in September. Don Meyers, Long Beach Township (LBT) Beach Supervisor, recognized the school's need for instruction and provided Justin Steele, a Southern graduate and member of the LBT Beach Patrol, to train the school nurses along with vice principals Eric Wilhelm and Eunice Pschorr. Afterwards Sharon Bayne, one of the nurses, noted the importance of having the AED's and trained staff on campus. "This makes Southern a safer place to work and visit. There literally have been hundreds of lives saved throughout the state of New Jersey by trained Auto External Defibrillator (AED) personnel."

The training will be accomplished in phases. The next one reached out to a larger portion of the staff – physical education teachers, winter coaches, and several security people. Each building has its own defibrillator, and one

Cross-Curricular Sculpture Recreates Chaos

HS teachers Ellen Plumley (math), Jenn Plumley (art), and Irene Muzyka (science) worked together with their students on an interdisciplinary unit on fractals/chaos. After learning about fractal patterns and their applications in art and nature, the students learned about Chaos Theory and the Butterfly Effect. The sculpture, which students built outside, culminated the cross-curricular study of Fractals and Chaos Theory and integrated art, math, and science. The spiral pattern of the sculpture used the concept of fractals and the Golden Section. The pinwheels allowed the students to observe the Chaos Theory and wind patterns. Ratios were determined using Trigonometry, and the pinwheels were placed at precise points on the spiral. Each class was responsible for one spiral in the sculpture. The project remained outside as long as possible to allow students to watch the degradation and see the Chaos Theory in action.

This group visits the mission several times a year to volunteer their help in the kitchen and storeroom. Supplies such as a toothbrush, toothpaste, soap, deodorant, and shampoo would help them in this process. Using the money given to them through a minigrant from the Home and School Association, they prepared about 50 "exit care packages" of toiletries to bring with them. In addition to the November visit, they have scheduled another trip for January.

A year ago Southern Regional School
District was missing this vital piece of
medical equipment – a cardiac defibrillator.
Now they have several. It all began when
student council members along with advisor
Marilyn Dougherty and school psychologist
William Halbeisen sponsored a project to raise
money to buy a defibrillator for each building.

The drive, called the "Quarter Mile Race for Life," was held both in and out of school. Their goal was to collect a mile of quarters in the hope of purchasing defibrillators for the district. They collected donations from staff, students, and community. Donations came from Mrs. Simon's and Mrs. Przybylski's math class, Mrs. Triano's class, Mrs. Berardi's classes, Steve and Beth Klemens, Bob Johnson, Ocean Township PBA, Ocean Township Municipal Authority, Rotary Club, SR Home and School Association, Beach Haven Exchange Club, Student Council, and the Board of Ed

In addition, two brand new defibrillators were donated by the American Red Cross and Beach Haven Moose Lodge 1575.

The Southern Regional High School campus has become a seven-day a week activity center for both the school and the community.

A student and staff population of over 4,000 on campus on a daily basis in addition to after school and evening activities keeps the campus working around the clock. Dougherty, who realized the importance of having comprehensive equipment close at hand, worked closely with the students to help make this a reality for Southern. She explained, "The need for this equipment is not limited to our adult population. Each year more and more student athletes suffer from cardiac arrest on the field due to undiagnosed cardiac problems occasionally resulting in death."

In the Classroom

SRMS Extreme Team students have adopted World Hunger as their service project this school year. In social studies a discussion regarding the devastation that occurred in Haiti from then Tropical Storm Jeanne as well as the effect Hurricane Jeanne had on Florida prompted a review of current news articles and motivated the students to help those in dire need outside their own country. Susan Rosenberg, library professor from Brookdale Community College and President of the NJ/Haiti Chapter, Partners of the Americas, Washington, DC, provided them with list of needed items. Students worked for two weeks buying and collecting items with the generous support of their families. Once the items were sorted and boxed, social studies teacher Clair Chapter transported the truckload to Brookdale Community College where volunteers took them to Long Island to be placed on board a cargo ship bound for Haiti. Money was also collected and will be used to defray costs for containers, trucks, and bodyguards in Haiti.

Don Erichson and the students in his three Junkyard Wars classes held their first annual Junkyard Wars Chariot Race on a course near the tennis courts. Students were divided into teams and given specifications and 15 days to design and construct a push cart chariot which would be powered by two humans while steered by a third human. The vehicle would compete in a timed race on an obstacle course requiring turning, stopping, and reverse moves. It could have no fewer than three wheels and had to have operating brakes and a steering system. The final product had to pass a safety inspection prior to competing. A drawing of the final design along with a construction journal was submitted with the final design. The students had a great time and learned how to improve next year's design.

SRHS Social Studies Department sponsored a World War II living history presentation for its students. They met with World

He added, "The SR Adult School staff enjoys the opportunity of utilizing our great facilities for the benefit of so many enthusiastic participants. We are truly a community of learners. Through the efforts of our new Enrichment Coordinator, Janice Polito, we have added courses such as Cajun and Creole Cuisine, Pottery, and How to Get Published, taught by certified teachers, accomplished entrepreneurs, and published authors."

LAUNCH Offers EMS Program to Students

Southern is on the cutting edge of education once again. It is only one of two high schools in the state to offer an EMS program as part of its curriculum. At Southern it is a five credit class taken by seniors enrolled in the LAUNCH Academy. Currently 22 students are enrolled. These students are already cadets in their local First Aid Squads and have completed the Basic Life Saving course and are certified in CPR. On Tuesdays and Thursdays during periods 7 and 8, they meet with a certified EMS instructor who comes to the school. The rigorous academic curriculum includes 120 hours of instruction and an internship of at least 10 hours at the hospital. Once they have fulfilled these requirements in early June, they will take the national exam for EMS certification.

Learning Academies: Understanding New and Challenging Horizons (LAUNCH) is under the direction of Vice-Principal Eunice Pschorr. The goal of the program is to prepare students for science and allied health careers and to help them easily make the transition from school to career. Its interdisciplinary curriculum allows students to satisfy graduation requirements while providing time for work experiences outside of the classroom, thus giving them interaction with professionals and valuable workplace experience.

Seniors in the academy take SLE (Structured/Service Learning Experience), a five credit class, that takes them into the community where they work with a mentor on the job. Community agencies that have established mentorships with the district include Southern Ocean County Hospital, the Ocean County Sheriff's Department, and Community Medical Center. Several students completed the LAUNCH program in June 2004 and are actively pursuing careers in medicine.
